In conclusion, everybody buys and uses shoes, but we often don't now how much

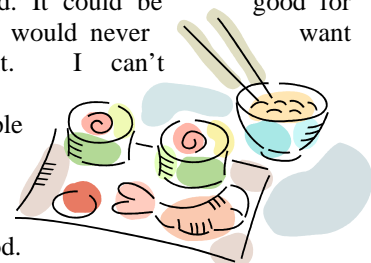
trouble the shoemaker experiences. And all of this is done for our beautiful stinky feet!

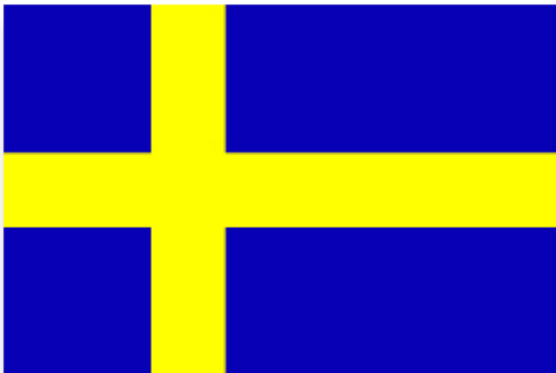
